The state house with the tiled roof became popular as the population increased and housing was sort after, these were very sturdy houses still build of native timbers. By the time the sixty's came native timber was getting short and bevel backed pine weatherboard was being used as cladding, more windows were used and the houses were much lighter inside. Kitchens became more spacious and more rooms, electrical appliances were being more ready used
